Dear Pawtucketville Families,

Learning takes energy! As you all know, the modern world throws many distractions at our kids and our goal as educators is to keep their focus on academics. One way to support your child and the school is set your kids up with a good night sleep on a regular basis. Spring brings the MCAS test to the 3rd and 4th graders. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommends the following sleep hours for elementary school age kids:

- Children 3 to 5 years of age should sleep 10 to 13 hours per 24 hours (including naps) on a regular basis to promote optimal health.
- Children 6 to 12 years of age should sleep 9 to 12 hours per 24 hours on a regular basis to promote optimal health.
- Teenagers 13 to 18 years of age should sleep 8 to 10 hours per 24 hours on a regular basis to promote optimal health.

Research clearly supports that adequate sleep improves attention, emotional regulation, mental and physical health. The AAP also suggests that screen time stop at least 30 minutes before bedtime and to keep all video temptations out of kids' rooms.

We are seeing a rise in tired kids at Pawtucketville. In addition, we know that many of our kids are having a tough time "turning off" their brains for bed. Our social workers are available to assist parents with finding helpful resources or talk to your child's pediatrician if you are struggling with bedtime.

Please help your students learn and socialize by supporting them with a great night sleep!

In math, we are continuing with place value, and will strengthen our skills in order to solve addition and subtraction with larger numbers through 120.

We are super excited for a new writing unit. We will be exploring Realistic Fiction. Students will be creating their own book series based on a character they make up. We are excited to see their imaginations come to life through their writing!

CONTENT LITERACY

The school year is nearly over! In Content Literacy we have been busy learning about new social studies and science topics. 4th Graders have been identifying USA regions and the 50 states and capitals. We had a States and Capital bee earlier in March and completed a test. In 3rd Grade, students learned about biomes and spent a lot of time doing a research project on a specific biome. They presented their work to their peers. By the end of March to early April they will have brainstormed and created a new animal species in class. 2nd graders have been learning about the 6 types of simple machines and reviewing their schema of force and motion. We have done engineering challenges to explore this topic. 1st graders have spent the month of March learning about penguins. They made their own penguins and even designed a shelter for penguins. Kindergartens have worked diligently on differentiating between "wants" and "needs." They will also continue this topic into April with learning about money and being able to identify USA currency.ty was superb!

Second Grade

Eureka Math- We are midway through Module 5, Addition and Subtraction Within 1,000 With Word Problems to 100. We continue to build precision with the addition and subtraction of 2 and 3 digit numbers. We will then move back to Module 2, Addition and Subtraction of Length Units, which focuses on Metric Measuring. Activities are designed to deepen an understanding of measurement and to relate it to addition and subtraction. The students will work with metric units. This is designed to support place value concepts such as one hundred centimeters is 1 "hundred". Story problems will involve comparing lengths such as "How much longer...?" and "How much shorter...?"

Science- Our insects have arrived. The students are mega excited to be working with live creatures! We welcomed the mealworms last week. The students are assigned to the care of 2 mealworms. We get to observe the complete life cycle from larva to pupa to the adults who lays eggs, and the cycle starts again! It is amazing to be able to watch it all happen. The students also practice responsibility and respect for life through their involvement with the insects. Milkweed bug eggs arrived on March 27. Silkworms and painted lady butterflies are scheduled to arrive over the next few weeks.

Literacy- Our new Literacy Unit is called, "Once Upon a Time: Adapting Fairy Tales & Writing Stories". The big idea is that students learn about writing stories through the study of Fairy Tales. Fairy Tales are generally short with a clear beginning and an end, which supplies a sense of closure. They follow a sequence of events. They use transitional phrase to help glue the scenes together. The characters are brought to life. The setting is developed, and plays an important part in the stories. The way Fairy Tales create the world of a story is a powerful model for our students to use when they write their own stories. We will read a variety of Fairy and Folk Tales. We will also compare and contrast several "Cinderella" stories.

The students have been writing collections of Poetry. Grade 2 has been chosen to have several students from each class read their original poems at the April "All School Assembly".

We have been working hard on Math Module 5 on Fractions, and will soon begin learning about Geometry and Decimals as well. In Reader's Workshop and Writing, we have been working on reading poetry, MCAS passages, answering multiple-choice questions, and responding to open response questions. This will continue to be our focus to prepare for MCAS.

We have had a successful first round of MCAS Academy for ELA. We will be having Math MCAS Academy starting later this month. If your child receives an invitation to Math MCAS Academy and you would like your child to attend, please be sure to return the permission slip to your child's teacher. The dates of the Academy are April 23, 25, 30 and May 2 from 8:00-9:00 A.M. We hope to see your child there.

As of now, our last day of school will be Friday June 14 where there will be clap out for 4th graders. Our Fourth Grade Farewell/ Graduation is set for Thursday June 13th, and our Canobie Lake field trip will take place on Tuesday June 11th, with a rain date of Wednesday June 12. We will be sure to let you know of other important dates as soon as we know them.
