The Paw program is a school-wide social and emotional learning curriculum developed for Pawtucketville students. It is designed to educate students about essential themes and encourage them to put the ideas into practice.

Each month of school has a theme connected to it. The themes include school safety, respect, responsibility, friendship, achievement, kindness, perseverance, acceptance, focus and teamwork. We explore these important topics through a variety of means including morning announcements, morning meetings, community meetings, and all school assemblies. Our goal is to weave these lessons into the fabric of our day and encourage kids to put them into practice. Students that exemplify these themes during school can be nominated to be our Paw student of the month and honored at our monthly all school assemblies.

Students can also earn "Paws" for a variety of actions connected to our ten monthly themes. The rolling Paw cart travels to all the classes once a month and provides an opportunity for students to spend their earned Paws on some high interest items. First Grade

We hope you all are doing well. As the weather gets colder, please remember jackets. In writing, the students will begin their study of opinion writing by composing persuasive letters. We will be talking all about things kids want and want to change.

In math, we are finishing up module 1. Students are working on math fluency. Please practice flashcards with addition and subtraction up to 20.

In reading, the students are becoming words detectives. They are learning different strategies to decode words.

Second Grade

Our First Grade 2 Math Bee is scheduled to take place on November 20 featuring Addition Facts. Math Fact Fluency is a very important skill in completing Grade Level computation. It is such an important skill, our Grade 2 Team has set building Fact Fluency as one of our Team teaching goals for this school year. Mrs. Marshall has found an exciting and effective program called Ninja Math. The Team is working to familiarize ourselves with Ninja Math, and to build the components. We'll give you some more details next month!

In Eureka Math, we have finished Module 3 and are wrapping up the End of Module Assessment. We will return to Module 1 to revisit Sums and Differences to 100. We have been working to build flexibility with Place Value. This will help the students have an easier time with Module 1, and we will be able to move quickly through the strategies. We will then get into Module 4 Addition and Subtraction Within 200 with Word Problems to 100, which is the heart of Grade 2 Mathematics.

Writer's Workshop- Students are publishing their Personal Narratives and the last week in October will be dedicated to conferencing. The teachers will be able to have a discussion with each child about his/her writing. This process helps each child see what was strong in the written pieces, and areas where some improvement would enhance the writing.

Then, we will begin to work on persuasive reviews. We'll write reviews of books, movies, restaurants, and family attractions. Writing an "Opinion Piece" is an important standard. The students really enjoy this genre of writing, and the teachers very much enjoy sharing their reviews.

Interactive Read Aloud-We gave been listening to stories and the "Essential Question" has been to describe how the character responded to events and challenges in the stories. Our next question will focus on determining the central message in a story.

Fourth Graders are off to a great start to the school year. For the past ten weeks we have worked hard to establish classroom rules and routines.



In Writing, students will continue to work on realistic fiction stories and will finish off our unit by bringing their stories through the writing process. Next, we will be moving into learning how to write personal essays during our Writer's Workshop lessons.

In Math, we have finished up our first module on place value and have moved into Module 2, which is a very short module on metric conversions. This will be followed by Module 3, where we will dive into multi-digit multiplication and division.

The Vocabulary Parade was a huge success and we hope that everyone learned some "Great Big Words" from our Fourth Grade performers! We are looking forward to lots of exciting learning here at Pawtucketville, as our study of Regions around the United States are explored, as well as our study of Motion, Force and Models. November Health News

November is Diabetes Awareness Month – Talk to your health care provider about the risk factors in your family, take precautions, & support the people you know with diabetes!

Continue to say "BOO" to the Flu! – This year, the Centers for Disease Control advise everyone 6 months of age and older to get a flu shot during the months of October and November. Talk to your doctor. Handwashing is imperative during the seasonal flu months.

Please keep all sick children home from school especially if they are exhibiting respiratory and stomach symptoms! If you are unsure – stay home and call your health care provider or school nurse for advice.
