AAEC Rewards Program

October was the official kickoff month for our AAEC Reward Program!



Last month, AAEC morning students were introduced to the Reward Program and Center. Each class was given a demonstration of the process by Giovanna and previewed the many rewards available.

The Rewards Program encourages students to accumulate points to exchange for rewards (prizes/ gifts). You earn points by having good attendance, borrowing books from the library cart, using IXL at home, achieving goals, participating in school and community events and activities, and more.

Each month, a statement listing your total earned points is distributed in class. You can accumulate your Reward Points through the year to get the biggest rewards, or cash them in as soon as you get them.

The Rewards Center is open once a month for students to redeem their points, and located on the first floor, outside Room 3. You can choose from a variety of prizes like T-shirts, jackets, water bottles, insulated mugs, books, school supplies and dictionaries.

We learned about the many resources the library has to offer including discounted museum passes, computer access, printing capabilities, and citizenship preparation courses. We also learned about the many ways we can use the library while preparing for the GED or HiSet Exam. The library has GED and HiSet study guides and many online resources that we can use!

Taste Test Marks the Beginning of the Library Carts Program



A fun and tasty activity marked the beginning of Library Cards program for students in Jen and Carrie's classes. After reading the book "Johnny Appleseed," the students in both classes got together to try red, green, and yellow apples and vote on which was tastiest. A colorful graphic was used for voting. The red apples won!

The Susan Silk Library Carts are mobile libraries for AAEC morning students. ESOL and HSE students can borrow books from the library cart to help practice their reading skills and share with amily members at home. Reading to your children helps to encourage a love of reading.

Each class has a set time for students to select a book to borrow. There are many genres to choose from and all different ability levels.

As of November 3rd, over 100 books have been checked out of the ESOL and HSE carts. Students share their book by either completing a book report, or giving a book talk, building on their speaking, reading, and writing skills.

HSE Student Highlight

Aung's Adaptation: One Student's Approach to Learning English



HSE teachers would like to highlight a very enthusiastic student, Aung. Aung is from Burma and comes to classes each day eager to learn. Aung can often be found before class or at break time looking at various books on our library cart.

He recently shared a story with one of his teachers about his love of learning English while in Burma. He said that he learned English by reading classic English literature. "You learned English by reading the classics?" his teacher asked. "Yes, I read lots of classics like *Wuthering Heights by Emile Bronte, Tom Sawyer by Mark Twain, and Little Women by Louisa May Alcott (who is from Boston)." His teacher was surprised and asked "How did you manage to read such classic stories that are written at such a high level?" He went on to explain his method. He said "I would start with the easiest adaptation, or version, of the book I could possibly find. This would give me a good idea of the overall story and the main characters. Then, once I finished reading it, I would find another adaptation that was just a little more challenging and read that one so that I could learn new words in English. Then I would again read a more advanced book to learn even more vocabulary. Since I already knew the storyline, I knew what was going on and could really focus on learning new vocabulary. I would continue finding more challenging versions (often 5 versions of the same story) until I could read the original classic novel."*

Aung's teachers are so very impressed! Reading the same story but increasing the level of difficulty with each new version of the book was brilliant! Since he was already familiar with the characters and basic story, it allowed him to build a larger vocabulary base while adding more and more exciting details to add to his story. One could imagine it would be like learning to draw a picture of your favorite place where you would first lightly sketch out a drawing with a pencil, then going back over the sketch and gradually using darker outlines. Then using certain basic colors with a large paint brush to add structures, and beginning to add lighter shades of colors with another brush to add dimension to those structures, and then finally, with a smaller paint brush adding all of the tiny details to your favorite place turning what was once a pencil sketch into a masterpiece of artwork!

Good readers form pictures in their minds and imagine the places described in books. We can only imagine all of the wonderful places Aung has pictured in his mind from the books he has read and where he has yet to go in the books he will read in the future! Thank you, Aung, for being a great student, and for sharing your book adaptation idea with us! We created a new section in our HSE book cart called "Aungs Adaptations" with a collection of classics written at different levels. Check it out, and you can read classic forms of literature just like he did!

HiSET & GED Testing Information

Residents of Massachusetts who desire to earn a High School Equivalency credential have the choice of two exams: the GED® or the HiSET®. Candidates must pass all subject tests in: the GED® exam, the HiSET® exam, or **a combination of both exams**. These exams are comparable in terms of passing rates and complexity, but they do vary in some ways. For example, the GED exam is computer-based only, but HiSET exams can be taken on a computer or paper.

In 2022-2023, the DESE made some policy changes to assist candidates:

- Candidates have the option to take any subject test in English or Spanish. All credentials will be issued in English.
- HiSET/GED Testing is **FREE**! The Commonwealth of Massachusetts will pay for a candidate's first HiSET® or GED® test in each subject, plus two retakes per subject. Enter the correct voucher code at checkout.

Use the same last name and email address, to ensure that your test scores are transferred. When scheduling any HiSET test, use promo code: MAHISET at checkout. Abisi Adult Education Center is an official Test Center for both exams. GED appointments will be released 30 days before the scheduled test date.


Vaccines offered:

• Updated COVID (2023-24 formula)* - Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna

*Note: COVID vaccine is only available for individuals who are uninsured or underinsured. They are in the process of ordering vaccines for those with insurance. Go to vaccines.gov/search for other locations.





On November 5, we turned our clocks back 1 hour. The skies are getting brighter in the mornings but darker earlier in the evenings.
