LINKS PROGRAM AT MIDDLESEX COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Karen Spengler, LINKS Program Coordinator and Advisor at Middlesex Community College, came and spoke with some of our HSE students about their program.

LINKS is a program for adults who are interested in enrolling in college and have a high school diploma or high school equivalency credential (HiSET or GED) but would benefit from extra support while transitioning into the college setting. The program offers smaller class sizes, individualized guidance, and a unique opportunity for students to acclimate to the academic setting while earning free college credits.

Classes are typically held during the day on Tuesdays and Thursdays and are run during the Fall Semester (Sept.-Dec.) and the Spring Semester (Jan.-May) at MCC's Bedford or Lowell Campuses.


THANKSGIVING FUN

STUDENT INFORMATION AND ACTIVITIES

PARKING

Parking is often difficult in downtown Lowell and can be costly. Students driving to school are encouraged to park at the Ayotte Garage, 1 Post Office Sq, across from Lowell High School.

On-street, metered parking is also available. Meters have a 2-hour parking limit Monday through Saturday, from 8:00am-6:00pm. It costs \$3.00/2 hours. The kiosk accepts cash and credit/debit cards. If a pay kiosk is not working, go to another one, and enter your space number. Do not forget to pay the meter. You may get ticketed.

- Do not park in the school parking lot.
- Do not park in the library parking lot.
- Do not park in the Santander Bank parking lot.
- Do not park in the Olympia Restaurant parking lot.
- Do not park in the Lowell Housing Apartment parking lot.



Cars may be ticketed and towed.

CELL PHONE REMINDERS

Cell phones are not allowed to be used during class time unless your teacher says it's alright.



Remember to turn your cell phone off or put it on silent mode before you enter your classes, then put it away. When a cell phone goes off in class, it distracts everyone and takes away from your learning.

If you need to take a call due to an emergency, like a call from work or child's school, quietly leave the classroom and take it outside into the hallway. Then, quickly return to your class.

VISITOR POLICY

The Lowell Public School Visitor Policy states all outside visitors must report to the main office and sign-in and out.

For the safety of all our AAEC students, outside visitors are not allowed to contact students during class time or to interrupt classes. If you forget something at home or someone needs to leave something for you, make arrangements to meet them after class. Deliveries and drop-offs are not accepted in the office. Please make sure you have all of your materials and items before you leave for school. Your class time is short and important for your continued success.

If there is an emergency, please speak with the office staff, and they can assist you.

SCHOOL CLOSINGS/DELAYS

The weather is always unpredictable in New England. In case of inclement weather, the Lowell Public Schools may cancel school or have a delayed opening. For example, last October, stormy weather and high winds knocked out power to many Lowell schools and residents resulting in school closings or delays.



Remember, we are part of the Lowell Public Schools and follow their school closing and delay policies.

IF THERE IS NO SCHOOL IN THE LOWELL PUBLIC SCHOOLS—MORNING AND EVENING CLASSES ARE CANCELLED.

IF THERE IS A TWO-HOUR DELAY IN THE LOWELL PUBLIC SCHOOLS—ONLY THE 11:00AM CLASSES WILL BE HELD. EVENING CLASSES MEET AT THE REGULAR TIME.

STUDENT INFORMATION AND ACTIVITIES

HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY (HSE) TESTING INFORMATION

The Massachusetts High School Equivalency credential is accepted by virtually all colleges, universities, and employers in the United States as exactly equivalent to a high school diploma. In order to earn the credential, you must take and pass either the HiSET or GED test. These tests are comparable in terms of cognitive complexity and rates of passing, but vary in significant ways as well.

Whichever test you choose, you must take it at an official test center in Massachusetts. The Abisi Adult Education Center offers classes that will prepare students to take either exam and is an approved test center. We offer $HiSET^{\odot}$ testing appointments for both Paper Based Testing and Computer Based Testing and GED^{\odot} Computer Based Testing. Testing dates are posted below and on our website at www.lowelladulteducation.com.

Detailed information about the two testing options, state requirements, accommodation for testers with disabilities, eligibility requirements, and other important information can be found on the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) website at www.doe.mass.edu/hse/.
