It is official! MCAS is now a computer based test (CBT). Our students were born into an age in which they have been dubbed digital citizens. Most have a level of comfort when it comes to the digital world unlike their adult counterparts. The key to our MCAS success this week will be staying calm, especially if an issue arises. The minute you start to stress, even the simplest of tasks becomes nearly impossible. So I ask you to remember this: if an issue arises in your testing room, start by taking a deep breath to keep yourself calm. If the issue wasn't addressed in the training video, simply pick up the phone and call the MCAS triage center in room 108 - extension 1080 in the old building, or 91080 in the new building (or Charlie's cell phone 508-523-5803). Charlie will be in direct contact with all the resources you need. Remember, we are watching the test from a console in the background. There will be at least 3 people constantly monitoring student progress, and restarting student tests that have stopped prior to their submission of the final answers. There will also be techs and helpers rotating through the testing hallways, so don't hesitate to flag one down if needed. aEverything is being backed up, and even if the power goes out, nothing will be lost. In the words of our fearless leader: "We've got this!"
